A RETURN TO THE STAGE

THANKS TO YOU!

Our 2022 Borealis Tour to Ontario and Québec marked NYO Canada's return to the stage after a two-year hiatus due to the Covid-19 pandemic. NYO Canada has emerged from this pandemic even stronger and continues to be a world leader in orchestral training. The painstaking efforts of supporters, friends, faculty, staff, and musicians over many years led us to the top. Maestro Sascha Goetzel, faculty, and audiences agree: this year was one for the books!

The 2022 Borealis Tour began in Kingston on July 20th at the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts. After departing on July 21st, the Orchestra performed in Montréal at La Maison symphonique, followed by Ottawa's newly-renovated Carleton Dominion-Chalmers Centre as part of the Ottawa Chamberfest. The Orchestra continued their journey to perform in Québec City's beautiful Palais Montcalm and concluded at Koerner Hall in Toronto. Works performed included Don Juan by Richard Strauss, Hungarian Dances and Symphony No. 4 by Brahms, Nino Rota's Trombone Concerto in C, and two Canadian premieres by composers Leo Purich and Katerina Gimon.

This extraordinary summer will always be seen as the moment the orchestra reconnected with Canadian audiences. It was an unforgettable year for everyone involved. Thank you to all the donors who believed in us and who have continued to support us so faithfully year after year.





PREPARATION IS KEY

Performances like the 2022 Borealis Tour take great preparation, which all began on June 19 with our comprehensive summer orchestral institute. 82 musicians, 55 faculty, visiting artists, commissioned composers, and conductor Sascha Goetzel converged in Kingston for five weeks of intensive preparation at Queen's University and the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts.

This year, we combined virtual and in-person training for the first time. This hybrid model, developed during the pandemic, allowed musicians to take advantage of more learning opportunities, and gave them the freedom to access workshop content on their own time. They had the opportunity to explore workshops on how to boost performance excellence, improve practice planning and skill retention, and help solve challenges like losing focus under pressure, and dealing with stress. These new elements build naturally on the highly successful J & W Murphy Initiative for Mental Health. Addressing health and wellness for musicians, who deal with very high levels of expectation and stress, is a key issue for NYO as musicians are three times more likely than non-musicians to experience anxiety and depression. For this reason, we extended the 1:1 confidential support from therapists. Musicians could access this service as early as May 19, until two weeks after tour. The pandemic has had a real impact on young people, and this year, it was more important than ever to have these resources in place.

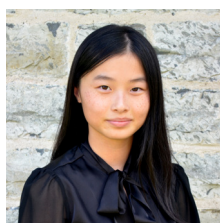

2022 MICHAEL MEASURES PRIZE WINNERS

Established in 2011 through a generous bequest, the Canada Council for the Arts Michael Measures Prizes annually recognizes two outstanding musicians aged 16-24, who are enrolled in NYO Canada.



Robert Conquer

First Prize - \$25,000 – Robert Conquer

Trombonist Robert Conquer, from Scarborough, Ontario, is quickly establishing himself as one of Canada's top young musicians. In the orchestral setting, he has performed in concert as Acting Principal of the Canadian Opera Company Orchestra and in the section of the Philadelphia Orchestra. As a soloist, Robert was the 2nd prize winner of the Canada Council for the Arts – Michael Measures prize in 2021. In 2020, he won first prize at the Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal competition, wherein he also received the Best Interpretation of a Canadian Work and Domaine Forget prizes. Robert is currently a Presser Scholar at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, where he studies with Nitzan Haroz and Matthew Vaughn of The Philadelphia Orchestra.



Arin Sarkissian

Second Prize - \$15,000 – Arin Sarkissian

Arin Sarkissian graduated from Rice University with a Bachelor of Music in Flute Performance studying with Leone Buyse. He recently studied with Jim Walker at The Colburn School. Arin was a 1st Prize winner of the 2022 Yamaha Young Artist Performance Competition and 2020 Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal Concours. This fall, he will join the Victoria Symphony as Principal Flute.
